2007 ALG Wolley Dod Award

This year our award goes to Gerry Hilchie and Doug Macaulay, for doubling the number of known sites for Erebia magdalena in Alberta. They found 2 new populations of this rare alpine butterfly, in their survey work in Wilmore Wilderness this past summer.

The Wolley Dod award is given annually for the most significant Alberta Lepidoptera discovery of the season.
